What We Do



E.A.R.T.H. is a year long elementary & middle school environmental education program. E.A.R.T.H. provides researchbased, hands-on curriculum and supply kits to local schools. These kits allow you and your students to perform more than 25 classroom experiments. At the end of each year E.A.R.T.H. sponsors a student workshop for all participants.

Why E.A.R.T.H. Exists



Local school district officials and environmental leaders found middle schools less well served than elementary or high schools with supportive science and environmental programs. Based on the recommendations of this education advisory group, the E.A.R.T.H. Steering Committee developed an award-winning (National

Association of Extension 4-H Agents Communicator Award for 2000) curriculum book for teachers choosing to participate in the program. The curriculum also meets Kansas state science standards.

Providing Learning Experiences



E.A.R.T.H. provides rich, hands-on science materials to elementary and middle school students in Kansas. Research shows that students are more likely to remember and be able to apply skills and knowledge that are experienced: 90% will remember what they see, hear, and do; only 10-15% remember things they have read or heard.

Students who participate in E.A.R.T.H. will be able to:

- \checkmark Explain relationships and interdependency of water, land, air and living resources.
- ✓ Describe the impact humans have on our planet.
- ✓ Plan steps of action to protect their environment through improved water quality, water conservation, protection of soil and air quality.
- ✓ Explain local water quality and challenges.
- ✓ Demonstrate skills and knowledge to make wise environmental decisions about local issues.

The E.A.R.T.H. program is a unique educational approach which promotes pollution prevention and awareness for our youth as a way of protecting this watershed and groundwater.

The Real World



Students have a chance to practice their environmental lessons in the real world. At the end of each school year, local environmental experts come together at the E.A.R.T.H. Workshop. Here, the students use critical thinking skills to apply lessons learned in the classroom to real-life environmental issues.
